She has brought a wealth of fundraising and leadership knowledge to our organization. We also welcomed Will Scholz, who spearheads our marketing initiatives from Southern Ontario. Despite this transition, we are proud to say that Mikinakoos continued to assist children across the 33 First Nations communities we serve in a full and meaningful way.

From celebrating student achievements to preparing kids for a successful return to school, each season brought meaningful opportunities to connect and give. Thanks to the generosity of our supporters — including Sprucegrove Foundation, PepsiCo, TD Ready Commitment, the Knights of Columbus, WestJet and others — we expanded our reach significantly. Our Winter Coat Drive more than doubled in size, providing over 1,400 coats to children in communities across the region. We were also able to deliver warm clothing and hockey gear to Cat Lake First Nation in support of a local youth tournament — a joyful and memorable experience.

These accomplishments are a testament to the strength of collaboration and the shared commitment to ensuring northern children have the tools, care, and recognition they deserve. We're excited to build on this momentum in the year ahead.

Warm Clothing Program Highlights

1,400+ Winter Coats Funded by Mikinakoos, TD and Knights of Columbus

Back in 2023, Mikinakoos distributed 480 winter coats across 18 First Nations communities. In 2024, we set a goal of beating this record, and thanks to our generous donors, meaningful partnerships and community support, Mikinakoos effectively tripled that number!

The success of this GivingTuesday coat drive was largely due to three main groups of supporters. First and foremost, **Mikinakoos donors raised an incredible \$11,372**, coming out in droves to support our mission.

We also received an incredibly generous \$25,000 donation from the TD Ready Commitment Fund as part of a two-year donation commitment.

Last but certainly not least, we teamed up with the Knights of Columbus Thunder Bay chapter, who matched the number of winter coats purchased for First Nations children in remote communities, doubling the initiative's impact from 700 to 1400 coats. This marked the second year of partnership between Knights of Columbus and Mikinakoos - and it's been an incredible success so far!

Backpack Program Highlight

PepsiCo Backpacks

On National Day for Truth & Reconciliation, we had the honour of speaking at PepsiCo Canada's headquarters in Mississauga, ON on the history and significance of this important day. Afterwards we worked alongside volunteers to assemble backpacks for the Indigenous youth of Fort Hope First Nation — where a devastating fire recently destroyed their school.

By the end of the day, our teams had smashed our goals and packed **300** backpacks with notebooks, pens, water, and non-perishable snacks.

Keewaywin Graduation Feast

In June, members of school administration from Keewaywin First Nation reached out to Mikinakoos requesting our help in procuring food for an upcoming grade 8 graduation ceremony.

Our Supply Chain Manager, Paula, personally delivered over \$1,000 worth of fresh fruit, vegetables and other healthy, non-perishable snacks to Keewaywin to celebrate the academic achievements of the community's youth. Everyone left the event with a full stomach and big smiles!

Healthy Living Program Highlights

Bearskin Lake Volleyball Tournament

In March 2025, Mikinakoos was contacted by the community in Bearskin Lake First Nation requesting support in funding their upcoming youth volleyball tournament.

Thanks to the ongoing support of our monthly donors, Mikinakoos was able to contribute \$3,500 to cover their administrative fees and help subsidize additional costs including equipment and refreshments.





WestJet Donates Hockey Gear to Cat Lake First Nation

For the fourth consecutive year, Mikinakoos received a generous donation from Canadian airline **WestJet**, directly benefiting youth in the remote First Nation community of Cat Lake. This year's initiative saw an impressive **1,300** pounds of gear collected from local hockey communities in the Oakville and Milton areas, reinforcing the commitment to making sports accessible for Indigenous youth.

The Mikinakoos team personally travelled to Cat Lake to deliver the hockey gear, along with several hundred pounds of clothes, much to the children's delight.

Backpack Event

Thanks to the Sprucegrove Foundation, 150 backpacks filled with essential school supplies and snacks were distributed to students in Keewaywin First Nation in September 2024.

Accessible only by air or winter roads, Keewaywin faces significant challenges in obtaining everyday items. The distribution of these supplies was crucial for students as they began the new school year and helped ensure they have the resources they need to succeed.

North Star Air - Corporate Donor and Fundraiser

North Star Air is a longtime supporter of Mikinakoos. In 2024/2025, North Star Air provided essential logistical support by sending several key shipments of clothing to remote communities. Their support was crucial in transporting Mikinakoos staff to these communities through the provision of no-charge chartered flights.

2024 Annual Charity Golf Tournament

In 2024, North Star Air held their third annual Charity Golf Tournament in support of Mikinakoos, **raising over \$18,000** to support youths in remote First Nations communities. The funds raised went to support Mikinakoos' core programming - our backpack, healthy living and warm clothing programs.


